A GUIDE TO VISITING A COLLEGE CAMPUS

A campus visit is your opportunity to get a firsthand view of a college. To really get a feel for the college, you need to walk around the campus, sit in on a class, see the athletic facilities, visit the library and/or visit the dorm rooms. A visit will also give you a chance to talk to students, faculty, and financial aid and admission officers who can answer important questions you may have. Listed below is a brief description of what to expect on your visit.

Gather Information and Explore the Campus

- Take part in a group information session at the admissions office.
- Interview with an admissions officer.
- Pick up financial aid forms.
- Sit in on a class that interests you. If classes aren't in session, see what the classrooms are like.
- Meet a professor who teaches a subject that interests you.
- Talk to students and ask them for their opinions of their classes and professors.

Explore the Campus

- Take a campus tour.
- Talk to current students about life on campus and the college.
- Check out the freshmen dorms and stay overnight with a student, if possible.
- Visit the dining hall, fitness center, library, career center, bookstore and other campus facilities.
- Talk to the coaches of sports that you may want to play.
- Walk or drive around the community surrounding the campus.
- Read the student newspaper.
- Scan bulletin boards to see what students' daily life is like.
- Go to the career center and learn what services are offered.
- Browse the school's website and any campus blogs.

Questions to Ask During Your Visit

- What are the best reasons to go to this college?
- What is it like to go from high school to college?
- What do you do in your free time? On the weekends?
- What do you love about this college?
- What do you wish you could change about this college?
- Why did you choose this college?
- What is it like to live here?

All colleges have admission offices that can help plan your visit. You can contact the office of admissions by email or phone through the college website to make a reservation.

JUNIOR COLLEGE PLANNING

On February 27, 2018, the Guidance and Counseling Center presented a *College and Career Planning Workshop* for parents of our junior class. Counselors advised parents about Naviance, the college search process, standardized tests, scholarships and college visits.

Likewise, the high school counselors will begin meeting individually with eleventh grade students to discuss their college and career plans. These meetings will begin in March. It is strongly recommended that parents be involved in this process. **If you are interested in setting up an individual meeting, please contact your child's counselor.**

Eleventh grade students can begin the college process now by:

- Using Naviance to search for colleges by major, location, size and competitiveness.
- Researching and visiting colleges by attending open houses. Open house schedules are listed on Naviance.
- Start thinking about your courses for your senior year.
- Register to take the SAT/ACT exam. Refer to the dates and deadlines listed.
- Research and register for *Summer Enrichment Programs*, if interested.

LOCAL SCHOLARSHIP UPDATE

Every year the Mount Sinai Senior Class is provided with the opportunity to apply for the various scholarships offered through our local community and the Mount Sinai School District. Those students who are awarded scholarships will be invited to participate in Senior Awards Night on June 4, 2018. At this time, students will be presented with their award and/or recognition.

The local scholarships available to students of the *Class of 2018* will be accessible for your/their review on the Naviance website. Please be reminded that your PowerSchool user name and password are applicable for accessing Naviance.

Likewise, Mr. Cassella, our scholarship chairperson, met with senior students on **February 27** to provide them with an overview of the local scholarships and the application process.

In years past, many students participated in the local scholarship process and the *Class of 2018* is encouraged to do so as well. ADVANCED PLACEMENT EXAMS 2018

Students who are enrolled in an Advanced Placement (AP) course will be taking the corresponding AP exam during the period of May 7 through May 18, 2018. Please check with your teacher regarding specific test dates and times. Students and parents will be receiving a bulletin outlining the AP policies and procedures for testing day and thereafter.
